

The lowa State Association of Counties (ISAC) is a private, nonprofit corporation. The organization was established by law on June 30, 1971, with the signing of Senate File 37. ISAC members are elected and appointed county officials from all 99 counties. ISAC is comprised of several statewide associations called affiliates. For example, all the county recorders in the state have their own association, which is called the lowa County Recorders Association and is cited as one of ISAC's affiliates. In total, there are 15 of these associations that are affiliated with ISAC.

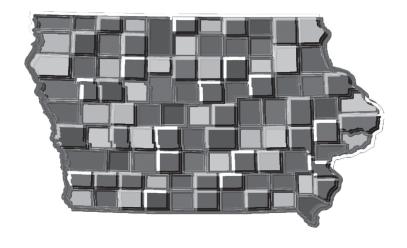
The main purpose of ISAC is to secure and maintain cooperation among the counties and county officials, promote comprehensive study of local problems and find ways of solving them, provide methods of interchange of ideas among various county officials and promote and work for the enactment of legislation that is most beneficial to the citizens of lowa. Counties pay voluntary dues to belong to ISAC. In return, ISAC provides a number of services to member counties, such as training, benefit programs, education, technical assistance and intergovernmental services.

ISAC's mission is to promote effective and responsible county government for the people of lowa. ISAC's vision is to be the principal, authoritative source of representation, information and services for and about county government in lowa.

highlights

July and August 2006

The second annual ISAC Scholarship Golf Fundraiser, held July 19th at Jester Park Golf Course in Polk County, raised \$31,000 for the ISAC Scholarship Fund. About 140 golfers, more than 50 sponsors, and numerous volunteers all made the day a great success, in spite of the record heat.

The ISAC Board of Directors adopted a Legal Information Policy to clarify the role of ISAC's legal staff in providing legal information to ISAC members.



Brad Holtan was hired as ISAC Accounting Manager.

The all-time county membership record of 2,075 was broken August 1 when NACo added 90 new member counties and three new 100% membership states in one week and surged to a total of 2,173 county members. At that time, 73 counties in Iowa were NACo members.



November 2006

More than 800 county officials traveled to Des Moines for ISAC's 63rd Fall School of Instruction held at the Downtown Marriott and Renaissance Savery in Des Moines on November 29 - December 1. During the ISAC general session the 2007 legislative package was debated and approved. The top priorities included: establishing a reformed property tax system in lowa that will stabilize the tax base and enhance local accountability; providing adequate funding for mental health services; replacing the 2,000 foot sex offender residency law with "safe zones" that prohibit sex of

fenders from coming near schools and daycare centers; and revisiting the balance between government accountability to the public and fiscal responsibility for intergovernmental agreements. The priorities were the basis for ISAC's lobbying efforts during the 2007 legislative session. New at the 2006 Fall School of Instruction was a keynote panel that discussed the results from the November elections. The panel included: Jeneane Beck, KUNI Public Radio; Dave Kraemer, Ames Daily Tribune; and Doug Neumann, Cedar Rapids Gazette. The general session also included a farewell speech by ISAC President Denise Dolan and a speech on the upcoming year by ISAC 1st VP Kim Painter. An ISAC Innovation Award was given to Johnson County for its MH/DD Jail Alternatives Program.

highlights

January and February 2007

The County-a-Day program at the capitol was revamped, resulting in six district meetings during the first three months of the legislative session. In addition to ISAC staff updates, presentations by state agency directors and governor's office staff were added to the legislative day agendas. ISAC lobbyists were joined by Ali Sutton, an intern from the University of Iowa, for the first half of the session. Ali focused her efforts on proposed changes to the Sex Offender Residency Law.

Hannah De Groot replaced Angie Ross as the ISAC Receptionist.

March and April 2007

More than 800 people attended ISAC's 64th Spring School of Instruction March 18-20 at the Marriott and Renaissance Savery in downtown Des Moines. On Sunday, March 18, ISAC held two seminars for attendees. David Rabiner was the presenter for both - the first seminar being "Insights on Leadership: How to Build Influence and Credibility" and the second entitled "The Magic in the Mix." On Monday, March 19, ISAC's FY07/08 budget was approved for the year during the morning general session. ISAC then awarded scholarships to eight outstanding high school students. Also during ISAC's general session, more than 300 county officials were honored with Years of Service Awards to acknowledge their dedication to serving citizens through county government. Years of Service Awards were given to county officials with 15 years of service or more (in five-year increments). Featured speakers during the conference included the National Association of Counties (NACo) President Colleen Landkamer; NACo 1st Vice President Don Stapley; and Charlie Wittmack, the first lowan to climb Mt. Everest.

Rachel Bicego replaced Denise Obrecht as the Marketing and Communications Coordinator.



June 2007

The ISAC Scholarship Golf Fundraiser, now in its third year, continued its great success. On June 13, ISAC raised over \$33,000 for the scholarship fund, which awards college scholarships to children of county officials and employees. And for the first time, a county team won the tournament. Plymouth County defeated two-time champion Ahlers & Cooney and more than 30 other teams to take home the trophy.

ISAC Legislative District Workshops were held in six different locations around lowa throughout the month of June. The workshops served as the last stage of ISAC policy cycle and gave the ISAC staff an opportunity to address final outcomes of the 2007 legislative session. Legislators also attended the workshops to make comments and answer questions from county officials.

president's comments

Kim Painter - President

It's a strange article to have to write, the last one before you stroll out the door and turn off the lights for the last time. As outgoing ISAC President, that's my bittersweet task for this year's annual report.



This will surprise no one, but a simple list of accomplishments isn't going to serve my purpose – after all, the pages of this report give you all that. The year drawing to a close is probably best summed up by a few observations.

First of all, the staff at ISAC is nothing short of amazing. They put in the hours, do the brainstorming, and produce prodigious amounts of work to help us clarify the organization's opinions to the General Assembly, the Governor's Office, and the entire state of lowa. Within ISAC itself, we see staff (including John) moving along to opportunities previously unforeseen. We are sad to see them go, but we also must recognize that in their wake possibility opens up for the organization to adapt in many ways. The results, if I know Bill Peterson, will be surprising, beneficial, and energizing for ISAC, yielding continued growth and strength for years to come.

So – as someone who all-too-soon will have to be careful not to let the finest door in the world hit her in the fanny on the way out - I have every reason to be more or less giddy as I prepare to step aside for a new president at the end of December. Still, it's tough to say good-bye.

Before I go, I must thank my own recorders' affiliate for their amazing support – first, for having the faith to put me on the ISAC Board, and this year, for their hard work on the golf tournament and the raffle we'll hold at Fall School to raise scholarship funds. They alleviated a lot of my worry with their energy, determination, and personal kindness towards me as I went through this experience. Recorders, you are a wonderful group, and I thank you.

A final observation for the year: You can't accomplish much of anything in this world without the love and support of your family. I must thank Jessica and Tim for their patience at my many absences from the home front.

In closing, I thank each of you reading this report. The honor of serving as your president has made for a remarkable year. I'll never forget it.

executive director's comments

Bill Peterson - Executive Director

As I sit down to write this, I am amazed that another year has rolled past. It hardly seems possible that it has been 12 months since I wrote last year's report. A lot has happened in that time.



First, I want to mention an addition to the ISAC staff that has made a real difference in our operation during the past year. Brad Holtan joined the association in August 2006 as accounting manager. Previously, Brad worked for the Auditor of State as a field auditor. The ISAC Board of Directors authorized this position during FY2006 but we hadn't found the right match until Brad came along. As many of you know, ISAC provides a number of financial and administrative services to our members. The programs we help manage require the auditing of five separate funds. We had just about reached our internal capacity to effectively manage the finances of all those programs. Lauren Adams and I have both welcomed Brad's expertise since he joined the staff. He has done a great job.

Second, there was a significant increase in activity related to two technology programs. The Electronic Transactions Clearinghouse (ETC) was created in 2003 to respond to the requirement that counties, as health care service purchasers, be capable of receiving and processing electronic medical claims in a secure environment. The major impediment to completing this process was the inability of health care service providers to submit HIPAA- compliant claims. Late in FY2006, Broadlawns Medical Center notified Polk County that it intended to begin submitting claims in the HIPAA format. Robin Harlow, ISAC Technology Project Manager, worked with the ETC Advisory Board, Polk County and Quilogy to upgrade the system created in 2003. In addition, Linn County expressed an interest in joining ETC to facilitate claims submissions by one of its major providers. The ETC server was brought in-house in December 2006. The electronic transactions from Linn County's provider began flowing through the clearinghouse in February and completion of the Polk-Broadlawns system was expected in September 2007.

Additionally, Robin Harlow began working with the County Technology Clearinghouse (CTC) Advisory Board. The CTC Advisory Board is comprised of ISAC affiliate representatives. The CTC initiated a three-part survey of county e-government readiness in June 2007. The survey is being compiled by lowa State University and it will be the basis for a report and two-day strategic planning session in October 2007.

Third, I want to report that ISAC had one of the most successful legislative years in recent memory during the 2007 legislative session. The timing was right to complete action on a number of initiatives that we have worked on for years. These successes will be more fully reported in other sections of this report. I want to mention here that it is really through your efforts that we able to achieve success. You have all worked hard the past few years establishing a credible relationship with your legislators. If you don't have that relationship, the association staff members representing you aren't able to achieve the results that you desire. I want to encourage you to keep those communications between you and your legislators going, it really pays off in the end.

I have to conclude by thanking you, the members of ISAC. It is your participation in association activities, from meetings to programs, that allows us to continue to design and deliver successful programs. Also, the 15 affiliate associations that make up ISAC have done a great job of selecting representatives to the ISAC Board of Directors. This Board works very hard to provide oversight and direction to the various programs. Please take a moment to thank them for their service on your behalf. Lastly, thanks to the members of the ISAC staff, they do a great job for you. Finally, please don't hesitate to call or stop by if you have questions or need assistance.

CCMS board of directors



County Case Management Service (CCMS) is a 28E organization created to provide support to counties who operate Medicaid case management services for persons with mental retardation, mental illness, or a developmental disability, either directly or through contract. The primary mission of CCMS is to help member counties comply with all applicable state and federal rules and regulations through the provision of technical assistance, training, and advocacy. The CCMS Board contracts with ISAC to provide staff support to the program.

The service began in 1992 and had a total of 65 counties participating in FY07. In addition, the number of consumers served by county case management programs increased slightly from almost 8,000 in FY2006 to 8,200 in FY2007. Approximately 500 case managers, administrators, supervisors, and support staff have received technical assistance and training from CCMS staff.

In FY2007, CCMS continued to provide the following training opportunities: CCMS Annual Conference, Advanced Case Manager Training, Case Management Supervisors Training, Cost Report Training, Support Staff Training, Strengths Based Training, and Fundamentals. In addition, CCMS staff began providing specialized training and technical assistance to the counties that enrolled as case management providers for recipients of the Home and Community Based Elderly Waiver.

CRIS board of directors

The primary mission of County Rate Information Systems (CRIS) is to establish a rate setting methodology based upon actual cost, standardized service definitions, standardized units of service, uniform classification of cost, and consistent reporting to enable participating counties to negotiate appropriate reimbursement rates with their MH/DD providers; and to facilitate effective and efficient communication between participating counties and their MH/DD providers through technical support and training.

The CRIS Board contracts with ISAC to provide staff support to the program. CRIS is a self-supporting program governed by an 11-member Board of Directors. The number of counties in CRIS grew to 65 by the end of FY2007, with 12 counties joining.

The CRIS Board contracts with the Eide Bailly accounting firm to provide technical assistance to providers on completion of the financial reports and analyze the cost reports and report on their cost report analysis.

ETC advisory committee

The Electronic Transactions Clearinghouse (ETC) was created in 2003 as a response to the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA).

The ETC website was up and running in October 2003 and is under the direction of the ISAC Board of Directors. The ETC website was established to: 1) provide HIPAA compliancy to member counties by enabling them to accept electronic billings, and 2) enhance communication between counties and their local providers.

An ETC Advisory Committee was established to provide input and technical assistance. The committee consists of no more than 10 members made up of county officials and employees. The purpose of the committee is to provide direction to the ISAC Board of Directors on the future of the ETC website.

In 2007, four counties (Henry, Decatur, Calhoun, and Linn) joined ETC. Currently 71 counties have joined the ETC via 28E agreements approved by their Boards of Supervisors.

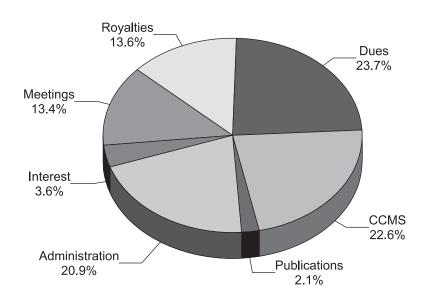

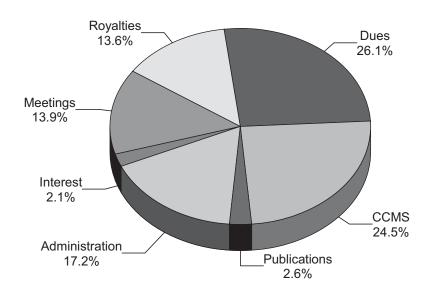

FY07 Income Breakdown

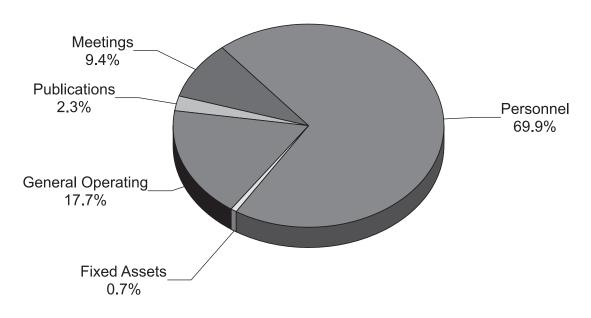


FY06 Income Breakdown

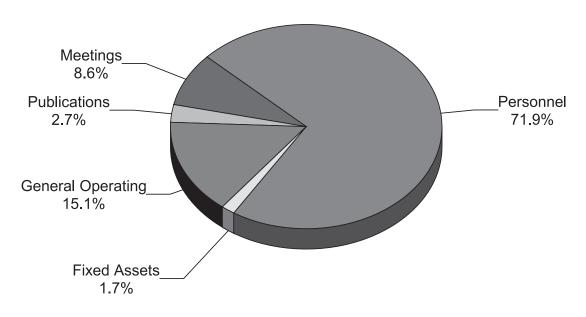
