lowa's County Conservation System is one of the most unique locally-managed programs for conservation and outdoor recreation in the United States. All 99 counties in lowa have established county conservation boards. Our Association is composed of all 99 counties. Collectively, we manage over 193,000 acres across the state in 1,822 parks, trails, natural areas, preserves and historic sites.

Facilities include: 10,500 campsites, 1,540 miles of trails, 640 pedestrian bridges, 471 lodges & shelters, 70 nature centers, 175 cabins, 1,480 support buildings, 450+ miles of roads, 7 million sq. ft. of parking lots, and tens of thousands of minor park facilities. There are 5 Conservation Board members in each county (495 statewide) and approximately 625 full and part-time employees in the system.

The Association assists its members in several key areas: board member/staff education & networking: legislative presence and lobbying service; and marketing & public relations. There are several events (conferences & workshops) held throughout the year – primarily focusing on board member and staff education. These are also opportunities for board members and employees to view products and services from firms such as yours. A synopsis of these events follows.

NATURAL RESOURCES AND OUTDOOR RECREATION TRUST FUND FUNDING AVAILABLE TO COUNTY CONSERVATION

ASSUMPTIONS FOR THE PURPOSE OF DISCUSSION:

- 1. A 3/8 of one cent sales tax will generate \$180 million in annual sales tax revenues.
- 2. 17 of Iowa's 71 (23%) state parks are managed by county conservation boards.

The trust fund will serve as a central depository for the revenue and will distribute the funds to the seven funding vehicles. As defined by lowa Code Chapter 461, when funds are credited to the account, the distribution percentages are designated as:

7% Lake Restoration \$12.6 million 10% Trails \$18.0 million 13% REAP (Resource Enhancement and Protection program) \$24.3 million 13% Local Conservation Partnership program (LCP) \$24.3 million 14% Watershed Protection \$25.2 million 20% Soil Conservation and Water Protection (IDALS) \$36.0 million 23% Natural Resources (DNR) \$41.4 million

To support the three broad categories of natural resources (Soil and Water; Fish, Wildlife, and Natural Areas; and Parks and Trails), the seven funding vehicles were identified as logical avenues to distribute the funding. The Advisory Committee worked carefully and diligently to reduce additional levels of bureaucracy for funding distribution by recommending current programs when applicable. The following four funding vehicles have established methods of distributing funds and will be able to effectively allocate using those methods:

- REAP (Resource Enhancement and Protection program)
- Lake Restoration
- Natural Resources (DNR)
- Soil Conservation and Water Protection (IDALS)

461.35 SECTION 13 - Resources Enhancement and Protection Fund (REAP) - 13% - \$24.3 million* Distribution would follow existing formulas -

- First \$350,000 to Conservation Education (CCBs can compete for grant dollars)
- 1% of remaining \$23.95 mil. (\$239,500) goes to DNR for administration of the program 20% of remaining \$23.71 mil. (\$4.75 mil.) is distributed to county conservation boards via: per
- county (30% \$1.43 mil.), and per capita (30% \$1.43 mil.) formulas; and, the remaining 40% (\$1.90 mil.) would be available for the competitive CCB grant program.
- Additionally, county conservation boards would be eligible for REAP Open Spaces dollars (\$6.64 mil.); Public Land Management dollars (\$2.14 mil.); and Roadside Vegetation dollars (\$72K).
 - * Recommendation from the Legislatively Appointed Advisory Committee is that this would be a second, separately funded REAP program in addition to the existing REAP program



EXPECTATIONS OF A COUNTY CONSERVATION BOARD MEMBER

Title: County Conservation Board (CCB) Member

<u>Basic Responsibility:</u> Works within the corporate, decision-making framework of a five-member board to set policy regarding activities and affairs of the conservation department, according to the guidelines set forth in Chapter 350 of the Code of Iowa.

<u>Term:</u> Five-year term. Selected on the basis of "demonstrated interest in conservation matters" as required by law (Code of Iowa) and other criteria indicative of a good board member, as indicated in this Job Description. Board members must be residents of the County.

<u>Compensation</u>: Conservation Board members serve without pay, but may be reimbursed for expenses incurred while carrying out official county duties.

Status: Once appointed, county conservation board members become county officials and should work to address the conservation needs of the county in a positive, responsible manner. Conservation boards receive county tax money and other funds to carry out their duties. However, the Conservation Board is a separate governmental entity, with the authority to govern itself and make decisions without interference or approval of any other governmental body, unless otherwise stated in the Code of Iowa.

BOARD MEMBER CRITERIA - The Selection Process

I. BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

- A. Advertise position opening for five-year term on county conservation board in local media 30-60 days prior to appointment date.
- B. Request that resume and application be submitted by potential appointee by December 10.
- C. Personally interview from 3-5 interested/qualified applicants.
- D. Incumbent board member should be given equal consideration with other applicants. Re-appointment should never be automatic. This will give a chance for new blood to come to the board as well as eliminating ineffective or burned-out members.
- E. You may wish to consider limiting terms by policy statement.
- F. Assure good background diversity on board (lawyer, business person, teacher, doctor, farmer, domestic engineer, etc.).
- G. Try to complete process by January 1st and make appointment for a five-year term.

JOB DESCRIPTION & EXPECTATIONS OF A COUNTY CONSERVATION DIRECTOR

The following Sample Job Description is offered as a tool for County Conservation Boards to develop job descriptions for the Executive Director position. Only aspects identified as being consistent statewide are included in this document. Specific descriptions for, and/or requirements of, work environment, residency and drug testing, salary guidelines or contracts, pre-employment background checks and physicals, EOE/ADA, work hours, benefits, and marginal or special job functions are not included in this Sample Job Description.

POSITION SUMMARY

The Executive Director is appointed by, and reports to, the Conservation Board. Serves as chief administrative officer for the Conservation Board and is responsible to plan, coordinate, direct and oversee all aspects of the County Conservation Board program and department. Responsible for administration of Conservation Board staff. Manages all real property under authority or management of the Conservation Board and implements Conservation Board activities as per the Code of Iowa (Section 350) and Conservation Board policies.

ESSENTIAL JOB DUTIES

- Sets and oversees direction for the conservation department by exercising general supervision of staff; organizing, coordinating and assigning program areas of responsibility to staff; and conducting staff meetings.
- Administers and develops written and oral policy and directives by formulating, planning and directing the county
 conservation program and staff in accordance with Conservation Board policy.
- Manages personnel by making final decisions regarding hires, terminations, and disciplinary action.
- Prepares reports and recommendations for the Conservation Board on a wide range of issues by researching records.




