

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FROM THE ISAC EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Do you sometimes get so lost in doing what you do every day, that you forget to remember why you are doing it? When I ask people about what they are doing or how they are doing, they somehow always bring into the conversation that they feel like things have sped up for them in the past few years. It is hard to find time to look back and see if you have accomplished what you set out to do. Do you feel that way?

Annually, your association, the Iowa State Association of Counties, tries to do just that. If you have gotten this far in *The Iowa County magazine* for November 2018, you have probably figured that out. This report provides information on many activities that the association performs; we hope you find it enlightening. But I was wondering whether the information provided allows for you to measure whether we have successfully achieved our common purpose (see definition of association). So, I went to ISAC's Bylaws to see if I could help you answer that question.

Article I: Purposes states "The purpose of this corporation shall be to:

- a. Promote efficient and economically sound county government for the citizens of Iowa.
- b. Maintain a permanent organization to promote cooperation among the counties and officers of counties.
- c. Study the problems of local government and assist in the application of knowledge obtained to promote the efficient delivery of local government services.
- d. Assist county officials with the exchange of ideas and experiences in providing local services.
- e. Collect, compile and distribute to county officials information about government and the administration of county services.
- f. Study the standardization of administrative practices to increase efficiency and reduce the cost of operations.
- g. Advise, cooperate with, and share information with the Iowa congressional delegation in Washington to promote the interests of and seek appropriate federal assistance for the counties of Iowa.
- h. Advise, cooperate with, and share information with the Iowa General Assembly to promote the interests of county government.
- i. Seek legislation that will preserve county home rule authority and vigorously oppose legislative or other initiatives that see to limit the citizens' right to locally determine services or governmental structure.
- j. Secure cooperation among counties in matters that affect the rights and liabilities of all counties.
- k. Initiate litigation to protect the rights and limit the liabilities of the counties under any constitutional provision or statute, appear as a friend of the court in any court proceedings where the rights or liabilities of the counties may be affected, and appoint or employ counsel for these purposes.
- I. Cooperate with the National Association of Counties, other public and private organizations, or other units of government when appropriate to research and promote improvements in the delivery of local government services.
- m. Seek financial assistance from endowments, funds established for municipal research and betterment, or from other legitimate sources to carry out the purposes of this organization.
- n. Appoint and employ counsel when required to fulfill the obligations of the corporation.
- o. Perform all other things necessary, proper and fitting to achieve the purposes of this organization or to provide appropriate services to member counties.

That is a pretty long list. I wonder if you can look through our annual report and identify activities that we report on that are directly related to these purposes. So make a list of purposes from a to o; write the program, service or activity related to that purpose: include your name, county and office; and send it to me - bpeterson@iowacounties. org. If you can articulate a program, service or activity for 12 of the 15 purposes, I will put your name in a hat and draw three names. The three names drawn will receive a complimentary registration to the 2019 ISAC Annual Conference.

To conclude, thank you for your service to your county and the citizens you represent; county officials and employees are the best. And, thank you for being a member of the lowa State Association of Counties, I hope you see value in our common purposes.

The ISAC staff works hard for its members. We strive to protect your interests and to make your jobs as public servants as easy as possible. To guide our efforts in achieving that goal, staff have adopted five core values. They are to:

- Work as a team





Iowa Precinct Atlas Consortium On January 1, 2018 ISAC began providing IPAC members with technological services, software development and maintenance, hardware support, and training. Services are covered by annual dues.

Within its current membership of 77 Iowa counites, there is potential for IPAC pollbook to be in 1,384 polling locations across Iowa.

SAVE MONEY HIPAA ASSISTANCE

17 counties and 4 MH/DS regions participate in the ISAC HIPAA Program and gain benefits by pooling their money to receive services that wouldn't otherwise be affordable. HIPAA Program members have taken advantage of countless benefits for a small annual fee. 6 webinars were conducted by a combination of ISAC staff and outside professionals, worth over \$4,000 in speaker fees. Over **20**hours, the equivalent of over \$5,300 of outside counsel, and far more ISAC staff time have been spent researching and answering HIPAA questions.





ISAC began the management of the Iowa County Attorney's Case Management Project (ICAMP) in July 2016. The mission of the project is to improve the efficiency of the prosecutor's office in Iowa. This is accomplished through: the Prolaw legal case management software; data exchanges with various criminal justice components across the state; a charging table that contains up-to-date statutes for all Iowa criminal code statutes; and member support. 

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


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
