

#### You Are Where You Need to Be!

Annually we try to capture a snapshot of the activities that have engaged us as staff for the lowa State Association of Counties (ISAC). We pursue them for a variety of reasons, but all are focused on serving our association membership. Some services are directed by the ISAC Board of Directors, contracted for by our affiliate groups, done to assist you in doing your job at the county better, or are expected of us by persons or organizations external to the association. All are constantly

under review to determine whether we are performing them to the best of our ability. Our reporting method for the past few years has been the November issue of *The Iowa County magazine*. Please take a few minutes to catch up on what we have been doing.

While we are reporting our activities as we normally would, it is safe to say that since March 17, 2020, life has been anything but normal. One of the last normal things I recall doing was attending the ISAC Spring Conference in Des Moines on March 12-13, 2020. Then on March 17, 2020, Governor Kim Reynolds issued her third Proclamation of Disaster Emergency, which essentially shutdown the state in response to the COVID-19 Pandemic. Since March 18, ISAC staff have been operating in a virtual world as 85% of the staff members work from their homes. I will share with you how that effort is going, but first I want to share a few facts about calendars, and what we were doing prior to March 18, 2020.

Did you know, there are lunisolar, solar, lunar, and seasonal calendars besides calendars that measure years? The oldest calendar is thought to be a Mesolithic arrangement of twelve pits and an arc found in Warren Field, Aberdeenshire, Scotland. It is a lunar calendar estimated to be around 10,000 years old. (As a side note, it makes one wonder how space travelers coming upon a climate cooked planet Earth, a half million years from now, will interpret 12 hog confinement buildings surrounding a manure pit.) You may be familiar with the term B.C. (Before Christ), which is now commonly referred to as B.C.E. (Before Common Era). You may also have heard of A.D. (Anno Domini), an era that was the brainchild of a guy named Dionysius that measures the years since B.C.E. ended. So, I am wondering if I can declare the start of a new era, maybe calling it P.C.A. (Post COVID Arrival). I calculate that I'm as qualified as the individuals who declared the previous ones. After all, I've got an iPhone, iPad Pro, and two laptops. Now, let's get back to what we did pre-P.C.A.

Because P.C.A. has been so consuming, I had to go back to my Outlook calendar to remind myself of ISAC happenings since July 1, 2019. Everything about that time now seems so far away. On a personal note, I reached some milestones during the past year: my 40th ISAC

work anniversary; my 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary as ISAC executive director; and my 40<sup>th</sup> consecutive ISAC annual and spring conferences. I am not usually one to spend much time celebrating, but it seems pretty amazing to have lasted this long. However, when I took time to stop and reflect, I realized it isn't because of anything amazing I have done, it is because of what an amazing job you have done. It has been the combined acts of kindness, mentorship, and forgiveness that ISAC members and staff have blessed me with during this time. It has been the trust, support, and friendship given by you during both good and difficult times. Thank you so much for these gifts. I couldn't have survived without you!

While doing my calendar look back, I discovered so many things I wanted to share with you, but I have space for just a few highlights related to pre-P.C.A. I remembered the trip to Washington D.C. in July 2019 to attend a briefing sponsored by the White House Office of Intergovernmental Affairs. I traveled there with ISAC President Burlin Matthews, other Iowa county officials, and county officials



from Nebraska, Kansas, and Missouri. A discussion focal point was the record-breaking flooding along the Missouri River in March and May of 2019. We wanted to know how our federal partner was going to help the individuals in this area recover. Two month later in September, excessive rainfall again drove the Missouri from its banks, adding to the misery of residents, and making the recovery even more difficult. Like you have been for me, county officials were where they needed to be to help. As residents still grappled with that damage 18 months later, along came the new challenge of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The ISAC Board held its annual retreat and planning session in September 2019. We weren't able to travel to President Matthew's home county as planned, but as the Board has done in previous years, we set aside normal association business and spent time on organizational wellness. President Matthews asked breakout groups of board and staff members to identify three things that ISAC should stop doing, do better, and start doing. Ideas were prioritized based on the number of times they were raised. The top priorities were presented at the November 2019 ISAC Board meeting and fell into the following four broad categories:

- 1. Refine how programs and services are financed to ensure there are adequate resources and staffing to effectively manage programs.
- 2. Focus association communication vehicles such as magazine, social media, website, and new forum on maximizing their value as connection points with members.
- 3. Enhance our member engagement activities, such as conferences, meetings, webinars, and virtual interactions, to provide the maximum return on member's time investment.
- 4. Expand our influence with the public, state, and federal policy makers, and other coalitions in the public arena to ensure that the "voices of county officials" are heard and understood.

I want to emphasize these were not areas identified as a result of failure. These priorities are forward looking and help identify for us what is most important to the Board and membership. As mentioned earlier in this article, our goal is always to do better and be better. Your board representatives were right where they needed to be, to help us make that happen.

I think all of us were looking forward to 2020 and the start of a new decade. It seemed to start off like it was going to be a pretty good year. ISAC President Burlin Matthews and I had great trip to Washington DC for a meeting with fellow state association presidents. We experienced an exceptional leadership program at George Washington's home in Mount Vernon. Early in the year, we started to hear some background noise about a disease in China called the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19). I don't think it really registered with a lot of us. ISAC University was a successful and well attended event held in mid-January. Staff helped the Iowa State Association of County Supervisors host its annual winter meeting at the end of January. I am not claiming there is a clear correlation, but shortly after Rachel Bennett broke her foot in mid-January, the first COVID-19 cases showed up in the United States.

Iowa legislative activity was heating up in February 2020. The idea of increasing the sales tax to fund conservation and mental health services was gaining traction. ISAC's Government Relations Team was busy supporting good ideas and fending off bad ones. A group of Iowa county officials attended the NACo Legislative Conference in Washington, D.C. in late February and early March. President Trump addressed NACo members during



a very well attended general session. NACo members were also treated to a very informative session with Former Secretary of State Colin Powell who shared his 13 rules of leadership. All that attended arrived home safe and sound, but the world was really starting to change by then. This brings us back to where I started, the ISAC Spring Conference and P.C.A.

As I reported earlier, starting March 18, 2020, ISAC staff moved to an almost completely remote and virtual work environment. In many ways, the period from that day in mid-March to the end of the fiscal year was really a blur. Every ISAC team and staff member was learning to get their work done in new ways. In those first few weeks, association team managers met for a daily debrief at 8:30 am every morning via Zoom. There were daily team meetings to connect members and identify what needed to be done. We established an internal COVID-19 pandemic response team that included the executive director, government relations team, legal staff, and communication staff. The COVID-19 team was responsible for gathering and interpreting pandemic information from our state and federal partners and determining the best ways to share it with our members. The Member Relations team quickly became experts at

managing Zoom, Microsoft Teams, and GoToWebinar virtual meetings for both our internal operations and to assist our members who might need a virtual venue.

While these activities were going on, the regular work of the Finance and Program Services, Government Relations, Information Technology, Legal, and Member Relations Teams went on as normal. Each member was pitching in to not only do the best they could, but to get better at doing it every day. Programs that we manage such as the Community Services Network (CSN), Iowa Precinct Atlas Consortium (IPAC), Iowa County Attorneys Case Management Project (ICACMP), ISAC HIPAA Program, ISAC Health Program, and many other services didn't miss a beat. Whenever something needed to be done, ISAC staff was always right where they needed to be to get it done.

I am literally out of the time and space my editor has given me. There is so much more that I could share with you about what the ISAC Board and staff have done to best serve you. We have been inspired to do it because whether it was pre-P.C.A. or P.C.A., we know that every day you have done your best for citizens in your communities. I wonder where they would be without you, because you are always right there where you needed to be to assist them. We can't thank you enough for your service. I can't predict what the future will be, when this pandemic will end, or how things will turn out, but I want you to know that your catfish friends at ISAC are in the pond waiting to help brighten your day. Be safe!





### SAVE MONEY GROUP HEALTH and WELLNESS

**25** counties participate in the ISAC Group Health Program and **26** are actively involved in the Wellness Program. The Wellness Program incentives have saved county budgets **\$1.54 million** in premiums, and its effects have saved countless more in the health of their employees.

ISAC MEETINGS AND EVENTS served nearly 4,000 attendees in FY 2020. In-person ISAC conferences and workshops were held until March 13, the final day of the 2020 ISAC Spring Conference, at which point all events moved online. The ISAC member relations team led nationwide meetings of state association staff to learn and share from the experiences of others. Staff implemented several new virtual meeting and event platforms for use by ISAC and affiliate associations. With the legal team, existing contract cancelations and postponements were navigated with minimal penalties.

### LEGAL ASSISTANCE

A valuable and easily accessible resource on the ever-changing legal issues that the COVID-19 pandemic has presented, the ISAC legal team spent around **375** hours assisting members regarding the pandemic.

ISAC adjusted its legislative priorities to reflect the political landscape following the start of the COVID-19 pandemic. The government relations team had successful outcomes on all four of its legislative priorities.
